Looking at the website of this Olympics, we see the three core concepts of the events; "Achieving Personal Best: Striving for your personal best," "Unity in Diversity: Accepting one another," and "Connecting to Tomorrow: Passing on the legacy for the future." Among them, the second concept is described as follows;

"Unity in Diversity: Accepting one another"

Accepting and respecting differences in race, color, gender, sexual orientation, language, religion, political or other opinion, national or social origin, property, birth, level of ability or other status allows peace to be maintained and society to continue to develop to flourish.

The Tokyo 2020 Game will foster

a welcoming environment and raise awareness of Unity in Diversity among citizens of the world.

Sadly, our society has flowed in the opposite direction from unity in diversity. We divide each other based on differences such as our race, color, religion, and political opinion. I believe that, in reflecting on the state of the world today, "Unity in Diversity" was chosen as a concept of the Tokyo 2020 Olympics.

This concept may remind you of our 12th World Dobo Gathering's theme in Los Angeles in 2016. The theme for the event was "Dobo: Seeking Unity in the Midst of Diversity." As well as the Tokyo 2020 Olympics, unity in diversity is also the basic

principle of Buddhism because it is the way to sustain our society. And most importantly, it is the way for us to liberate ourselves from suffering created by us.

"We are all different, therefore, we are equally invaluable"— this is what Buddhism tells us as the truth of our existence. The following passage in the *Amida Sutra* depicts this;

There are lotus flowers, as large as chariot wheels, growing in the pools. Those of blue color emit blue radiance; those of yellow color emit yellow radiance; those of red color emit red radiance; and those of white color emit white radiance. They are exquisite, wonderful, fragrant and pure.

The large size of those flowers symbolizes the depth of our lives. And as the various color of lotus flowers in the Pure Land, each of us is unique, and our lives are precious as if they emit brilliant light.

Buddhism also reveals that we are not aware of it even though it is the truth of our existence. When we are ignorant of our own preciousness, we do not respect others as invaluable ones as well. As a result, instead of respecting differences, we use them as a reason to discriminate or exclude others. It means, in return, we are also discriminated against and excluded by others for the same reason. Buddhism repeatedly emphasizes that this is how we harm others and society and create our suffering. Ignoring the concept of "unity in diversity," we treat others and ourselves the opposite way without knowing it. Therefore, the passage in the *Amida Sutra* works as a mirror for us and encourages us to be awake to how far we are from the path of unity in diversity. Facing our reality in front of us and thinking about it is painful, yet, without the process, our path toward unity in diversity is

never settled in us. In other words, when we genuinely accept the harsh reality and deeply regret our hypocrisy, we come to see the path on which to walk.

It is like going on a trip using a map to reach your destination. We can find the place we want to go to on the map. However, we do not know how to get there without first finding our current location. It is not until we see exactly where we are that the path to the destination is determined. In the same way, we may agree with the necessity of unity in diversity and praise it as our goal. However, it will end up merely as an idea with no substance unless we truly face the reality that we use our diversity to divide us. We deeply feel regretful about our insincerity. And as we struggle to accept this reality, it can actually motivate us to devote ourselves to seek unity in diversity.

Buddhism constantly reminds us that respecting differences and treating others as invaluable ones is the aspiration we all share deep within. That being so, the path to seeking unity in diversity is, in fact, the path to return to our innermost aspiration. (「調和」9頁からの続き)

仏教は違いを認めてお互いに尊ぶ生き方を大切に説いてきました。それは、それが相手を利することであり、社会を持続可能なものにしていく道であると同時に、何よりもそれが私たちを苦しみから解放する道だからです。さらには、そのような生き方を願うその願いは私達一人一人がもっています。自らの意識すら超えた心の奥にもつ願い、あらゆる人をつなげるその深い願いに還れという呼びかけを私達は仏法のはたらきとしていただいているのではないでしょうか。

多様性と調和 見義信香

7月23日に東京オリンピック・パラ リンピックがついに開催されました。 ご自宅で観戦していらっしゃる方も 多いのではないでしょうか。新型コロ ナウィルスの世界的蔓延の影響で一 年延期となった大会であり、現在もウ ィルス感染の流行が収束しない中で の開催とあって、待ち遠しさ以上に 「本当にできるのか?」という不安 の中での開催となりました。史上初 の無観客開催などこれまでのオリン ピック・パラリンピックとは大きく異 なった形ではありますが、一つ変わ らないことがあるとすれば、それは全 力で試合に臨む選手の姿であり、彼 らから受ける大きな感動ではないか と思います。

東京オリンピック・パラリンピックの大会ビジョンを見てみますと、「全員が自己ベスト」「多様性と調和」「未来への継承」の三つが基本コンセプトとしてあげられています。特にこの中の「多様性と調和」には次のような説明がされています。

「人種、肌の色、性別、性的指向、 言語、宗教、政治、障がいの有無な ど、あらゆる面での違いを肯定し、 自然に受け入れ、互いに認め合うこ とで社会は進歩。

東京2020大会を、世界中の人 々が多様性と調和の重要性を改め て認識し、共生社会をはぐくむ契機 となるような大会とする。」

オリンピック・パラリンピックは文字通り異なる国や文化の人々との出会いを私たちに開き、その出会いが私達の生活や考え方をより豊かなものにしてくれる、そのことを教えてくれる機会ではないでしょうか。

同時に「多様性と調和」がますます 世界全体の課題であるということを 示してくれているように思います。そ して今回のオリンピック・パラリンピ ック大会と同様に「多様性と調和」 を常にその理念としているのが実は 仏教の教えであると言えるでしょう。

仏教は私達の存在の真実、つまり ありのままの姿を表す教えです。それ は「誰一人として同じ人間はいない」 ということと「だからこそ一人一人 がかけがえのない存在であり尊い」 という事実です。違うことが当たり前 である、という考えに立っているのが 仏教の教えなのです。『阿弥陀経』の 中で浄土に咲く蓮の華が「池の中の 蓮華、大きさ車輪のごとし。青き色に は青き光、黄なる色には黄なる光、赤 き色には赤き光、白き色には白き光 あり。微妙香潔なり」と表現されてい ます。これは誰一人として同じ人はお らず、それぞれが輝きを放っていると いうこと、そしてそのような存在の深 さを大きな車輪の如しとして私達に 知らしめてくれています。

浄土は私達のあり方を映す鏡です。 「青色青光、黄色黄光、赤色赤光、白色白光」は、それが本来の姿であるにも関わらず、そのことに気づいておらず、その事実に背き続けている私達の姿を同時に照らし出してくれています。「多様性と調和」という理念もまた、それが実現されていなはという厳しい現実を顕しているという厳しい現実を顕しているという厳しい現実を顕しているという厳しい現実を顕しておます。だからこそ、この理念が国として掲げられているのでしょう。
